<u>Linking arms with researchers at Griffith University's Institute for</u> Glycomics tackling sarcoma with early detection and treatment options.

While it is considered a rare cancer in adults (1% of adult cancers), sarcoma is a prevalent cancer in children representing about 20% of all childhood cancer diagnoses.

The term Sarcoma summarises a large number of different cancers that arise in the bones and connective tissues such as fat and muscle. Depending on where they first occur in

the body, the different types of Sarcoma differ significantly in their pathogenesis and thus, need to be considered as individual cancer types. They are also often diagnosed late as many benign conditions exhibit similar symptoms. Hence, there is a great need for new ways to accurately diagnose and treat sarcomas early.

Through your generous support, Institute for Glycomics researchers will use world-leading technology to identify new treatment options and potential new diagnostic markers in a 3-year intensive program. The first six months of the program has been dedicated to extending our team of scientists and establishing new infrastructure and specialised instrumentation that will be a pivotal component of this sarcoma research and that was co-funded by a private trust. The Sarcoma program will be conducted in our world-leading ACRF International Centre for Cancer Glycomics facility. With particular regard to researcher recruitment and



extending our team of dedicated scientists, we are delighted to report that a research fellow has now been appointed to the project through Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation support, and advertising underway for additional technical staff.

Critical to the success of the project is the collaboration with our international partners. Our international partners include clinical oncologists with particular expertise in paediatric sarcoma, and are currently preparing an initial bank of patient samples to send to our team. Our imaging and mass spectrometry specialists will be processing and subsequently analysing the sarcoma tissue samples utilising the Institute's glycomics analytical platform, to identify what we term 'markers' for different sarcoma subtypes. New markers are important as they can form the basis of new ways to diagnose sarcoma disease. They can also provide clues as to why some patients respond to cancer therapy and why others don't. We are confident that our approach will help to deliver new solutions to diagnose and treat sarcoma.

We are deeply grateful to the Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation, their community and our other support partners for supporting this critical research.




MONTHLY "FUNDRAISING BAZAAR/BBQ" - SATURDAY, 26TH MARCH

Since 1996, Lions Australia has con-tributed over \$12 million to childhood cancer research. This effort has helped the development of safer and more ef-

the development of safer and more effective blood stem cell transplantation for leukaemia patients following chemotherapy, leading to shorter hospitalisation and more rapid recovery.

The battle against childhood cancer is not yet over. Funds raised by Lions Club of Phillip Island at this Easter BBQ will be used to support the best scientific and clinical childhood cancer

research conducted right across Australia. Many of the other 1200 Lions Clubs across Australia will be running similar BBQs throughout 2022 to add their contribution to the fight against childhead concer. childhood cancer

A particular target for the funds raised in 2022 is to contribute to leading research in Cancer Immunotherapy, focusing on supercharging the body's natural defences to destroy cancer cells.










Coin line update in kilometres



We have raised \$109 024.75 which converts to 42.58 km

We are asking all Australian Lions and Leos to consider holding a Coinline event in the next few months culminating in a massive effort during September, so that we can attempt the Record in November. As well as gaining a Guinness World Record, Aussie Lions will have made a great contribution funding research into cures for Childhood Cancers.

Some Clubs are holding "Coin Jar" collections. Why? Because most of us use plastic when shopping, so the coins are just filling jars and bowls around the house and gathering dust. As a public service, we can help to clean out those jars and put the coins to good use! One Club is proposing a "Putt Putt" Coinline. They are seeking sponsors for each of the eighteen holes. They in turn find people to lay their coins in a line from the Tee to the Cup. Simple, isn't it?

Yet another suggestion is to "Lay them in the aisles". Map out the aisles at your local Hardware store or Supermarket, then sell each metre for \$2.50. (1 metre equals approx. 50×5 cent coins end on end, that's \$2.50), issue a ticket for each donation and draw a lucky winner. The prize could be a voucher from the store. If you get all the way around, start a second lap!

Whatever you can do to help us; it will be greatly appreciated by the families that are afflicted by Childhood Cancer. It is for them, that we support the work of the Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation. It may have taken a while to reach the halfway point, I'm sure that with a big effort we can reach our fundraising goal by September.








Lion Jessica is a member of the Epping-Eastwood Lions Club. She will be organising the coin line challenge for her Club.
