









It was also pleasing to hear of the impact that our Lions Kids Cancer Genome Project had on the institute's research work and the fact that it is continuing to impact research and treatments at various facilities around Australia and other parts of the World.

The Foundation was pleased to hear a number of positive stories in relation to the Foundations at your District Conventions and I thank the various ALCCRF District Chairs for their hard work and dedication.

My apologies to District Governor Brian Grieve and the Lions of District N1, I was invited to speak at their convention in Glen Innes in mid-October. Unfortunately, my wife fell ill on the morning we were to depart on our nine-and-a-half-hour drive and I had to withdraw.

My usual quarterly update of our current projects is as follows: -

- 1. Telethon Kids Institute (TKI) Paediatric Cancer Immunotherapy (\$1.05m) That component of the project now completed. Additional new funding of \$200k approved, Outstanding commitment \$100,000.
- 2. Cancer Australia, Priority-Driven Collaborative Cancer Research Scheme
 - a) Dr Jessica Buck Exploiting and enhancing brain-resident immune cells for the treatment of paediatric brain stem glioma, University of Western Australia /TKI (\$54.8k) Outstanding commitment \$1,838.
 - b) Dr Klaartje Somers University of New South Wales/CCI (\$100k) Outstanding commitment \$100,000.
- WEHI Enhancing CAR-T cell therapy to treat childhood leukaemia (\$596k) Outstanding commitment \$298,000.

- 4. Griffith University's, Institute for Glycomics Focus on Sarcoma early markers, improve diagnosis targeting pathways to treatment (\$800k) Outstanding commitment \$350,000.
- 5. University of Newcastle Development precision immunotherapeutic strategy for paediatric brain tumours (\$635k) Outstanding commitment \$547,500.

HOPE LIONS DONATE to ALCCRF

HOPE Lions Club Branch recently donated \$4,000.00 to Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation.

GLOBAL CAUSE ... CHILDHOOD CANCER

So far, an update on numbers from the District for this Financial Year have not been received. They will be included in my next report when they arrive from Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation (ALCCRF).

A virtual Coin Line fund was run at the Convention and with contributions from Dalby, Redcliffe Central, Pernvale and Toowoomba Wilsonton and members attending the Convention a total of \$236 was credited to the District and the Clubs who provided their coins during the Convention.

In addition to the almost \$600 raised from the District in response to my participation in the JuLike My Chops fundraiser, the collection tin at the information table raised \$100. I was also able to bank a further \$66 from the sale of merchandise mainly from the Christmas pins. I still have stock and they will be at the Cabinet meeting in Roma. So if you haven't picked up the latest pin for your collection, either let me know and I will arrange to get one to you or you can pick it up at the Cabinet Meeting. They still only cost \$6.

Chelsea's Chop for a Cause

Hair-Raising Stuff

Every year, more than 950 children are diagnosed with cancers, three will die from cancer every week.

For the past 30years Australian Lions have been spearheading the fight against childhood cancer in Australia and this year, Rockhampton Fitzroy River Lions have gotten behind 11 year old Chelsea Jennings who had 48cm cut from her hair in a bid to raise funds for the Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation (ALCCRF).

Rockhampton Fitzroy River Lions spokesperson Katheryn Barrett said Lions supported Chelsea in her fundraising quest and hosted an evening for this brave and generous young girl when she had her hair cut.



"Chelsea's Fundraising Page for the ALCCRF received \$2276 and included donations from friends, family and other Clubs," Mrs Barrett said. Another \$1052.70 was raised during the evening. In total \$3328.70 was raised for ALCCRF.



Members from Gracemere, Marlborough and The Caves Lions Clubs were also present to watch as 48cm of Chelsea's beautiful blonde locks were cut off to shoulder length.

"Chelsea's hair was loosely plaited into six plaits to mark where to cut and her cousin and hairdresser Casey Vallence went to work.

One by one the plaits were cut off and handed to Chelsea.

"Chelsea smiled her way through it all holding up the plaits for everyone to see.

Her hair will be packaged and sent to Wigs for Kids." Chelsea said, "she had been growing her hair since Prep School. "I love having long hair, but I also wanted to grow it long enough to donate to kids with cancer."











In her thank you to Rockhampton Fitzroy River Lions Club for their sponsorship, saying that she

decided to donate her hair to the Wigs 4 Kids campaign organised by the Kids with Cancer Foundation.

"The campaign accepts hair donations and uses the hair for making wigs for kids which they provide to the kids free," she said.

Judith Letchford, Lions Q4 District Chairperson on behalf of ALCCRF thanked Chelsea for her fundraising efforts, saying that, "Chelsea's thoughtfulness towards others is beyond her years, and she's an amazing young girl." "Well done Chelsea and a big thank you for all your efforts and for your families support towards raising funds for Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation."





Since 1996, Lions Australia have contributed over \$12 million to childhood cancer research. This effort has resulted in among other things, safer and more effective blood stem cell transportation for leukaemia patients following chemotherapy which can lead to shorter hospitalisation and more rapid recovery.

The Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation (ALCCRF) was officially established in 2009 with the prime focus being to increase survival rates of childhood cancer by supporting cancer research efforts not just in Australia, but around the world.

Sixty years ago, cancer was a death sentence, today 8 out of 10 children survive.

With assistance from grant money from the Australian Lions Foundation, the Soldiers Point Lions were proud to present Rebekah Wilson from the Hunter Medical Research Institute (HMRI) with a cheque for \$2,000.

The funding will enable Associate Professor Paul Tooney to purchase a much-needed Fluorimeter to examine the DNA in Brain Bank samples with the aim of customising treatments for individuals with brain cancer.

Joe-Ann Williams, the Community Liaison Officer from Tomaree High School, accepted a voucher for \$100 towards a Year 12 Special Recognition Award

Year 10 Student Ebony Lock, recipient of the Harding-Miller Scholarship, thanked Lions for their support of \$5,000 per year and was congratulated on her achievements to date and her unwavering commitment to her studies.

President Jayne Kilbride and Treasurer Cheryl Millar of the Tomaree Community Hospital Auxiliary presented the Lions with a certificate of appreciation for their donation of \$3,445 for two bed-chairs and their continuing collaboration in obtaining vital equipment.

"Funds raised for 2022-23 total \$14,532, with 83 percent going to the local Nelson Bay community," Lesley Wright told News of The Area.

"In addition to the donations mentioned above, the club also supported prizes for local primary schools, food and care packages for the Yacaaba Centre and the Tomaree Neighbourhood Centre, the Tomaree Prostate Cancer Group, the Koala Hospital, and our aged care facilities."

The remaining funds have gone to various causes in Australia, such as the tragic Hunter Valley bus crash and NSW floods.

International disaster relief and causes such as vaccination of children, prevention of blindness, and alleviation of hunger in developing countries have also been supported.

ALCCRF at Lions N5 Convention 10th November to 12th November 2023




